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**President Obama's Polarized Approval Ratings:** In his State of the Union address, President Barack Obama lectured Congress about bipartisanship. Despite his pledge to work with the Republican-led Congress, Mr. Obama has yet to make good on his promise and instead told Senate Democrats behind closed doors he planned to "play offense."

It is no wonder a recent Gallup <u>poll</u> shows Mr. Obama is on track to be the most polarizing president since polls began measuring approval ratings. From January 2009 to present, an average of 13% of Republicans and 83% of Democrats approve of Mr. Obama, resulting in an average party gap of 70 points. President George W. Bush's presidency had an average party gap of 61 (84% Republican, 23% Democratic average approval ratings). Moreover, each of Mr. Obama's six years ranks among the top ten most polarized years since 1953.

When he first ran for president, then-Senator Obama declared, "we need a leader who can finally move beyond the divisive politics of Washington and bring Democrats, independents and Republicans together to get things done." As he now threatens to veto bipartisan bills like the Keystone XL pipeline and ramps up incendiary attacks on political opponents, it is no wonder Americans are disappointed he has not been leader he promised to be.
